





The Berlin Declaration

Inclusive Education and Communities through Sports Global Game Changer for Youth of All Abilities

WHEREAS the participants in the Global Forum for Inclusion Partnering for Action, the first ever international congress happening during Special Olympics World Games which brings together participants of the Global Athlete Congress and the Global Youth Leadership Summit with representatives of national governments, international organizations, NGOs and researchers, have assembled in Berlin, Germany to celebrate the 2023 Special Olympics World Summer Games, the largest global sporting event of the year, and who also came to the city to join forces in the quest of driving inclusion forward around the world, leaving a fundamental legacy with this Berlin Declaration inviting every single person in the world to join by signing;

WHEREAS the athletes of Special Olympics, competing in year-round sports training and competition in communities around the world stand firm in their hope of a world where all communities offer sports for people with intellectual disabilities and all schools are welcoming of a diversity of talents and gifts;

WHEREAS governments, who have agreed to underscore the need for urgent action to propel inclusive education for students of all ability levels, with a particular focus on students with intellectual disabilities, and in view that improving local sports participation and well-being strengthens communities in general;

THE BERLIN DECLARATION

WHEREAS industry leaders recognize the importance of investing in inclusive education as a material component of Environmental, Social, and Governance performance and credibility, a key to unlocking potential and performance, and a precondition for reaping the benefits of diverse workforces:

WHEREAS global development stakeholders recognize and reaffirm the need for increased investment in inclusive education for students of different abilities, especially for women and girls, as well as the role that inclusive sports playsin every corner of the worldin the academic journey, in values education that fosters social cohesion and promotes human rights, in developing core skills for life and work in the 21st century, and for lifelong health;

WHEREAS academic leaders are committed to supporting research, evaluation, and analytics to strengthen inclusive education especially through sports programming for students of all abilities;

WHEREAS global philanthropy leaders anticipate investing in the expansion, through sports, of inclusive communities and inclusive education and the role that whole-school engagement can play in strengthening school climates for all students and faculty wherever in the world;

WHEREAS anyone signing this declaration supports the beforementioned stakeholders in their quest to achieve inclusion on all levels and anywhere in the world:

We all call upon governments and the global community to pledge action toward (a) creating, coordinating, and integrating appropriate cross-sectoral public policies making inclusive sports in schools part of the academic and educational journey of all students, (b) allocating financing, including official development assistance, adequate to ensure

the progressive realization of said policies, starting with ensuring that at least 3% of education budgets support inclusive education programming for students with disabilities, (c) upon achieving at least 3% of education budget for inclusive education programming, continue to striving to achieve an education budget that fully supports a comprehensive education for all students with disabilities, and (d) support especially Special Olympics to offer community-level inclusive sports worldwide.

We all call upon all governments worldwide to engage youth with and without intellectual disabilities to inform policy- and decision-making on how best to make schools, sports clubs, and communities fully inclusive for all students and participants, with the engagement of their parliaments and Ministries of Education, Sport, Social Welfare, Economy and International Cooperation and Development.

We all commit to concerted action to promote and invest in the transformative power of inclusive education through sports in every school, in every sports club, in every community, in every nation, around the world.

The Berlin Declaration

Inclusive Education and Communities through Sports Global Game Changer for Youth of All Abilities

Who we are:

We are the participants in the Global Forum for Inclusion - Partnering for Action. The Global Forum for Inclusion takes place during the Special Olympics World Games 2023 in Berlin. The 2023 World Games are the largest global sporting event of the year.

We are, for example, athletes, representatives of national governments or researchers. And we want to foster inclusion all over the world.

With the Berlin Declaration, we invite every single person in the world to join us by signing.

And more precisely we are...

- ...athletes of Special Olympics competing in year-round sports training and competitions around the world. We stand firm in our hope of a world where all communities offer sports for people with ID and all schools are welcoming different talents and gifts.
- ...governments that have understood the need to foster inclusive education for students of all ability levels, with a particular focus on students with ID, considering that improving local sports participation strengthens communities in general.
- ...stakeholders and industry leaders that recognize the need for increased investment in inclusive education for students of different abilities, especially for women and girls, and the importance of sport.

THE BERLIN DECLARATION - SIMPLE LANGUAGE (SUMMARY)

- ...academic leaders that are committed to supporting research, evaluation, and analytics to strengthen inclusive education especially through sports.
- ...people from all over the world who sign the Declaration because we want to support the goals and demands of the Declaration.


What we demand:

- We call upon all global governments to
- take all measures that are necessary to make school sport inclusive.
- provide adequate funding to implement these measures.
- use at least 3% of the education budget for pupils with ID.
- aim for an even larger budget that fully supports all students with disabilities.
- support Special Olympics to promote and challenge inclusive sport worldwide.

And we call upon all governments worldwide to involve young people with and without disabilities to inform politics on how schools, sports clubs and communities can become inclusive for all.

We also commit to promoting inclusive education through sport in every school, every sports club, every community, every nation, everywhere in the world.




Access to the Global Forum



Where will society meet in the future? Cultural places look different in each country and community. One thing, they all have in common: the idea of being places where people meet and get together. In the event, examples, visions and elements for inclusive meeting places are being collected.

In order to improve the participation of people with disabilities and bridge the divide between the segregated world of people with disabilities and the higher education sector, the project puts into practice three articles from the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD):

- Article 24 (Education): A higher education is provided by offering qualifications for people with so-called intellectual disabilities over a period of 3 years.
- Article 27 (Work/ Employment): The educational specialists are employed on the first labour market at the university.
- Article 8 (Awareness-raising): The educational specialists convey inclusion competencies to future professionals through their seminars and lectures.

In this presentation, the educational specialist Samuel Wunsch and the educational partner Annika Hase give an impression of the Institute's history and the development of the qualification. They offer an insight into the educational work of the educational specialists at the university. In addition, Samuel Wunsch shares his experiences in regards to his educational and professional path.

At the end of the presentation, the participants exchange thoughts with the person next to them and get a chance to address Samuel Wunsch and Annika Hase with their questions.

To promote health literacy among people with intellectual disabilities, eight explanatory videos were developed in a participatory research project (GeKo-MmgB). Health literacy implies the achievement of knowledge level and personal skills to take action to improve personal health. Up to now, a target group-oriented approach has not been adequately conceptualized. A major criticism is a dominant functional view, e. g. only converting health-related information into easy-to-understand language. In our project the health literacy framework were modified target-group-specific and used for the videos. Through participatory involvement of potential users, videos were developed addressing revant health topics. Geko-MmgB presented the experiences of preparing information in a way that adequately reaches many people with intellectual disabilities and leading to action. Also the way health literacy is understood and improved in a target group-specific manner, which is critical to empowerment.

To support this, we present a portfolio-instrument: It is called MEIN.Profil = MY.profile. We have developed this portfolio-instrument in a participatory research project. It allows adults with learning difficulties in an easy-accessible and resource-oriented way to show their interests and strengths. And it allows to record one's own abilities and competencies in basic reading and writing and simple math in daily life. This helps to move on in activities in free-time, school or also at work. We show the participants how MY.profile looks like, how it works and what benefits it provides for adult learners. And, we are looking forward to your feed-back!

Over the past year, our sport community has seen many athletes struggling with depression or anxiety. In the United States, 1 in 4 players experience a mental disorder over the course of a year. It is unlikely that anyone who coaches a team is completely free of concern about mental health challenges. Individuals with intellectual disabilities are at higher risk of co-occurring mental health challenges, making awareness in the Special Olympics community even more important. The good news is that as coaches, mentors, or peers, we can make a difference – WE CAN SAVE LIVES! This session is designed to discuss protective and risk factors of sport environments, the steps that you can take to protect the mental health of your athletes and yourselves, while seeking to improve a player's fitness, and enjoyment of the sport. We will also discuss the mental health challenges that come with "Big Event" let down that is often seen in athletes after a large event like the World Games draws to a close. Together, we can continue to bring mental health to the forefront of sporting environments at all levels.

Abstract in easy language:

In the past year, many of our athletes have dealt with depression or anxiety. In the United States, 1 in 4 players suffers from mental health problems in the course of a year. It is unlikely that someone who coaches a team does not have to worry about mental health issues. People with intellectual disabilities have a higher risk of mental health problems. So raising awareness of this issue in the Special Olympics community is very important. The good news is that we as coaches, mentors or peers can make a difference - WE CAN SAVE LIVES! This session will focus on protective and risk factors and actions you can take to protect the mental health of your athletes and yourself. We will also talk about the mental health challenges that come with the disappointment of the end of a ,big event', which is common among athletes after the end of a big event like the World Games.
